As part of their topic 'Food Glorious Food, Reception visited Surrey Street Market where they learnt about selecting, tasting and buying their own food.



# ...We Listened

#### **School Events**

In our parent questionnaire responses, a few parents stated that they felt that there was too much communication from school, whereas a few other parents stated that they did not receive enough and that they need to know about events further in advance.

We are unable to please everybody, but as a reminder, we publish our school events and term dates in advance on our website and in our half-termly newsletters. We communicate with parents/ carers through a variety of channels. We regularly send information about trips, school events or fundraising initiatives by letter, email, text messages and posters on display around the school.

Unfortunately, our texting service (provided by Teachers2Parents) is unable to automatically send text messages to more than one mobile number which is why we ask parents/ carers to always indicate the mobile number that should be used as the 1st priority for contact from the school on admissions and emergency contact forms.

We have focussed on streamlining our communication to ensure that all communication indicates which year group it is addressed to. We endeavour to keep you updated of any changes to school events as far in advance as possible, however there are occasions where that will have to be last minute.

#### **After-School Activities**

Analysis of the feedback from our recent parent/ carer questionnaire showed that some families would like more after-school activity options to be available. We are always looking to see how we can improve the range of activities available, which is dependent on the space needed for each activity as we only have one school hall.

#### What after-school activity clubs are available?

We have had the following after school activities this half-term: Musical Theatre, Art Club, Multi-Sports, Gymnastics, Football and Street Dance. We rotate our after-school activity clubs to each year group each half-term.

#### How can parents/carers apply for a space?

Places for the clubs are allocated prior to the start of each half-term. Letters are published on the school website and sent out to each year group by email with the options available to select. Parents/ carers should return their request slip by the deadline specified in the letter. If you require a hard copy of the form please collect one from the school office.

#### How are the clubs allocated?

Once all slips have been received, 15 children will be selected at random to take part in the clubs. In the interest of fairness, we will be randomly selecting children from a group who have <u>not yet had a chance</u> to take part in an after-school activity club this academic year. In the event that the club is not full, we will then randomly select from children who have previously attended. Parents/ Carers will be notified by email or text if their child has a place at a club, and will be able to pay for the club on ParentPay.



#### **Curriculum Workshops**

During the Curriculum workshops for Reception, parents and carers had different activities linked to Maths to complete with their children—making their own maths board game, a hunt for 2D and 3D shapes in the Reception outdoor area, making shapes using large construction toys and making a bracelet using beads with a pattern.

During the Curriculum workshops for Key Stage 1, parents and carers had different activities linked to Maths to complete measuring capacity, length, mass and time.

#### Visits to local centres, places of worship and sacred spaces

At Park Hill Infant School, we have always taught our pupils about tolerance and this remains an important part of our curriculum. We ensure that we always celebrate diversity, promote equality and demonstrate respect. Our teaching in Religious Education enables children to build on their own experiences and to extend their knowledge and understanding of religious traditions. We use their experiences at religious festivals such as Easter, Eid and Diwali to develop their religious thinking. We organise visits to local places of worship, and invite representatives of local religious groups to come into school and talk to the children.

As a school, we value the opportunity to bring learning to life by arranging for pupils in Key Stage 1 to visit local centres and places of worship where they can meet members of the community from the tradition/ religion that they are learning about in class for Religious Education. As a minimum, pupils in KS1 should visit at least one site of traditional/ religious/ cultural significance.

We have endeavoured to ensure that we provide more opportunities for children in Key Stage 1 to visit centres for different faiths and religions. This year, pupils in Year One have visited St. Matthews Church and pupils in Year Two have visited Croydon Mosque and Islamic Centre. At these visits, pupils can ask questions, experience a religious and cultural environment, and meet members of the community who can respond to their thoughts and ideas. These visits contribute to pupils' spiritual development as well as giving many opportunities for exciting cross-curricular learning. These visits are not sessions of worship and are arranged to support children's learning in class for Religious Education, with follow up work being produced in class.

Our Religious Education Lead, Mrs Smith, has been looking for other centres that may be able to accommodate school visits and are close enough to travel to during school hours, such as a Hindu temple. If you have a suggestion of a centre/ place of worship that is close to the school, please email enquiries@parkhill-inf.croydon.sch.uk to let us know.

#### Reminder about social media

Social media (including all apps, sites and games that allow sharing and interaction between users) is a fact of modern life, and as a school, we accept that many parents and carers will use it. However, as stated in the Online Agreement which all parent/ carers sign as part of their child's admission to the school, we expect parents and carers to behave in a positive manner, engaging respectfully with the school and each other on social media, in the same way as they would face to face.

This positive manner can be summarised as not making any posts which are or could be construed as bullying, aggressive, rude, insulting, illegal or otherwise inappropriate. This applies both to public pages and to private posts, e.g. parent chats, pages or groups.

If parents have a concern about the school, we would urge them to contact us directly and in private to resolve the matter. Sharing concerns or complaints on social media is unlikely to help resolve the matter, but can cause upset to staff, pupils and parents, also undermining staff morale and the reputation of the school (which is important for the pupils we serve).

#### **Bikes & Scooters**

Please ensure that if your child rides their bike/ scooter to school, they dismount their bike/ scooter <u>before entering the school</u> <u>gates</u> and park their bike/ scooter in the scooter bay by the main school office. Park Hill Infant School cannot accept <u>responsibility for the loss or damage to any personal belongings left on the school premises including bikes/ scooters.</u>

#### **Administering Medications in School**



We can administer medicine in school. You will need to come to the school office to complete a parental consent form for administration of **any medicines**, including Asthma pumps. If your child has Asthma, we will also need a copy of their Asthma Care Plan.

Please keep us updated of any changes to your child's medical needs so that we can ensure we have appropriate staff training and access to Individual Healthcare Plans (where required.)

#### Uniform

Children should wear the following items, each clearly named:

- grey pinafore dress, grey trousers or grey shorts
- light blue shirt
- school tie
- royal blue cardigan or V-necked jumper
- for warmer weather: a light blue checked dress
- sensible school shoes.
- earrings are allowed, however, these must be studs not hoops. This is to avoid possible injury from getting them caught or pulled. (Earrings have to be removed before coming to school on swimming days—pool rules.)

#### PE Uniform

For physical education, all children should have the following items, each clearly named:

- a pair of navy blue shorts
- a light blue t-shirt
- Plimsolls
- for colder weather: a pair of jogging bottoms and a blue jumper.

#### None of our uniforms require a logo.

#### Buy new

You can buy suitable items from many high street stores such as Sainsburys, Asda, Lidl, Marks & Spencer, as well as Hewitts of Croydon.

#### Buy second hand

If you wish to enquire about any donated second-hand uniforms, suitable for sale at a reduced cost of £1 per item, please send an email to enquiries@parkhill-inf.croydon.sch.uk to let us know what items of uniform you are looking for and what size. We will then let you know if we have these items available and you will be able to make a payment on ParentPay. We will then have your items ready for collection at the school office.

#### **Reminder about school meals**

Our school meals are provided by the Folio Trust via Park Hill Junior School. School meals are free for all Infant aged children (Reception to Year 2). The menu is rotated every 3 weeks and the current menu can be downloaded from our school website. Hard copies are available at the school office.

The school meals meet the mandatory requirements of the School Food Standards 2015. The menus are nutritionally analysed to ensure they meet and in most cases exceed The School Food Standards with Halal Suitable and Vegan options available.

Therefore, these meals should not be subsidised with food from home, including condiments such as Tomato Sauce or Mayonnaise.

You are welcome to provide your child with a packed lunch from home every day, or on days where the school dinner is not to their taste.










# ATTENDANCE MATTERS





Our school gates open at 9am and close at 9.10am. Children need to be in class and ready to learn by 9:10am. Children arriving after 9:10am must be brought to the school office to be signed in.

It is a parent's legal responsibility to ensure that their child attends school regularly and punctually.

As a school we have a legal responsibility to advise parents if their child's attendance is a concern.

#### **Leave of Absence Requests**

If there are exceptional circumstances which require a leave of absence during term time, please complete the request form and return it to the school office as far in advance of the requested leave period as possible and <u>at least one school week prior to the absence.</u> This will give the school office adequate time to inform the Headteacher of your request. All requests for leave during term time will be considered on an individual basis and you will receive a written response.

Under section 444 of the Education Act 1996, the Local Authority may issue Penalty Notices to parents of children with unauthorised absences from school. The fines are issued to each parent, for each child, and are currently: £60 if paid within 21 days, rising to £120 if paid between 21 and 28 days.

### Changes to fines from 19th August 2024

Under new rules set by the Department for Education, from 19th August 2024, the Penalty Notice fines will increase to: £80 if paid within 21 days, rising to £160 if paid between 21 and 28 days.

Only 2 penalty notices can be issued to the same parent in respect of the same child within a 3 year rolling period. A second penalty notice issued to the same parent in respect of the same child will be charged at a flat rate of £160 if paid within 28 days. A third penalty notice cannot be issued to the same parent in respect of the same child within 3 years of the date of issue of the first Penalty Notice.

In the case where the threshold for a Penalty Notice has been met for the third time in a rolling 3 year period, a Penalty Notice cannot be issued, and the Education Welfare Officer may need to take alternative action including presenting the case straight to the Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2,500 per parent, per child.




